Normal Behavior and Interaction

Easy to handle; prefers a routine and similar times for playing, feeding and resting each day Hides in objects, but will come out when people are near the habitat

Chews on objects to maintain incisor teeth, which grow continuously; ensure have plenty of chew sticks available

Habitat

Remove wet spots daily; change bedding weekly or more often, as needed

Clean the habitat and its contents once a week with mild soap and water, rinse and allow to dry completely before placing the guinea pig back into the habitat

Groomina and Hygiene

Maintenance

Guinea pigs stay clean and rarely need baths; if skin becomes flaky and dry, wipe with baby wipes containing Aloe or a damp washcloth

Consult with a veterinarian if a guinea pig's teeth or nails seem too long

Because all guinea pigs are potential carriers of infectious diseases, always wash your hands before and after handling your guinea pig and/or the habitat contents to help prevent the potential of spread of

Pregnant women and people with weakened immune systems should contact their physician before purchasing and/or caring for a guinea pig and should consider not having a guinea pig as a pet. Signs of a **Healthy Animal**

- Active, alert, and sociable
- Soft, smooth skin
- Clear eyes

- Eats and drinks regularly
- Communicates by squeaking
- Walks normally

Common **Health Issues**

Health Issue	Symptoms or Causes	Suggested Action				
Diarrhea	Loose stools caused by poor diet, stress, internal parasites, unclean housing, or other illness.	Consult with an exotic animal veterinarian to determine cause and treatment.				
Malocclusion	Overgrown teeth.	Consult with an exotic animal veterinarian to possibly have teeth trimmed regularly.				
Mites	External parasite that causes irritation to the skin.	Contact an exotic animal veterinarian for treatment.				
Ringworm	Skin infection caused by fungi.	Consult with an exotic animal veterinarian for treatment.				
Scurvy	A disease caused by vitamin C deficiency that results in poor appetite, sore joints and chest, and bleeding from the gums.	If untreated, will be fatal; consult with an exotic animal veterinarian immediately.				

- Red Flags Weight loss
- Dried crust on front legs
- Diarrhea or dirty bottom

- Distressed breathing
- Lethargic
- Eye or nasal discharge
